Crestwood Village 1 Rules & Regulations

Continued from May's NL

Amended 06/27/2019



Obey the Rules or Pay the Fines

- 43. Planned absence from dwelling units for a period greater than two consecutive months shall require the following:
 - a. Notification in writing to the Board of Trustees and/or the District Representative. Drainage of all water systems, winterized or a minimum heat at 55 degrees from October 15th to April 15th.
 - b. Notify Trustees of address and telephone number of member or representative during period of absence.
 - c. Redirect delivery of mail and newspapers.
 - d. Member is responsible for any damages, injuries or extra expenses at his unit during its vacancy.

44. **PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES** WITH RESPECT TO RESALE OF MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATES.

a. NOTICE OF INTENT TO SELL

Notice of Intent to Sell, (on the prescribed form), must be given to the Co-op **prior** to any private sale or Sales Agency Listing. Reply by the Co-op will be made within seven (7) working days of notice by seller. Time will be required to make an inspection of the premises to determine its condition. Certain repairs and/or refurbishment may be required to obtain a certificate of occupancy from Manchester Township. The Co-op will not be responsible for appliance or major system defects or repairs. A determination will be made as to whether the repairs (if any) must be made prior to or during the listing period. Form of Notice of Intent to Sell is available at the Trustees' Office. Any inspections done by or on behalf of the Co-op are expressly for the use of the Co-op and should not be relied upon by any member or used in any way. The Co-op is not responsible for said inspections and members are encouraged to utilize their own inspectors. The Co-op does not certify that the unit meets the members specific needs.

b. LISTING WITH SALES AGENCY

Only after the Notice of Intent to Sell has been made to the Co-Op and its approval has been confirmed may the Membership Certificate be authorized for sale. That means that no Listing Agreement may be made nor can any Sales Agency accept a listing until such approval has been obtained. Also, arrangements must be made by the seller to undertake and complete the repairs as may be required by the Co-Op. If the Co-Op authorizes the repairs to be made after closing, the cost shall be paid out of proceeds of sale. Occupancy cannot take place until repairs are completed. Lock boxes are allowed with the permission of member. **No signs permitted with the exception of DURING an open house.**

c. DOCUMENTS REQUIRED AT SALE

Nothing more than the Membership Certificate and Proprietary Lease endorsed for transfer are required as long as the sale is unencumbered. In the instance of an Estate

of a deceased member, other required documents would include: (a) Death Certificate (with raised seal), (b) Surrogate's Certificate confirming appointment of the personal representative of the Estate, (c) Copy of Will, and (d) Tax Waiver. In the instances of incompetency, court papers confirming the Appointment of Guardian as well as Court Approval of Sale must be obtained. A paper listing emergency names, addresses and telephone numbers must be submitted at time of sale.

d. CLOSING

The Closing itself will be administered by the Co-Op. No date will be set unless all documentation set forth above has been previously received. No date will be set assuming the documentation will be delivered at closing.

VARIOUS CHARGES: Hereinafter set forth are various charges for replacement of documents and special procedures:

- (a) Replacement of lost Membership Certificate \$25.00
- (b) The fee for rescheduling of closing by Buyer, Seller or the Sales Agency is \$25.00 If the closing is within 24 hours the fee is \$100.00
- (c) Administrative Fee for resales \$250.00 from each the buyer and seller.
- (d) Membership Fee \$400.00 due from the buyer.

WALK THROUGH must be done before closing so that recently discovered problems can be eliminated. Units are sold "as is". Buyer assumes all responsibility upon execution of purchase documents.

I hope this month's Maintenance Minute finds everyone well during these very trying times. I would like to express my gratitude and appreciation to everyone for their patience and understanding over the past few months (and hopefully moving forward as well). This month I would like to discuss the Maintenance Department's "new normal" for the foreseeable future with regards to work orders and managing our work requests.

The Maintenance Department is now fully open, however, we are going to continue to limit exposure to our employees and residents. Therefore, residents will no longer be able enter the Maintenance Building. For all work requests moving forward, residents are to call the Maintenance Department, the Trustees Office or provide a written request which can be delivered to the mailbox in front of Friendship Hall or the box located outside the Maintenance Department door.

The Maintenance Department will be resuming full time hours as of June 1, 2020. Emergency related requests (i.e. plumbing, heating, and electrical) will take precedent. Exterior requests will be addressed at this time as well. Interior non-emergency related work requests will be added to a list and taken care of at our earliest availability. We have several items/follow up work that have been compiled during our "shut down" and will be the first to be addressed. These past items and new items will be handled on a limited basis to prevent over-exposure to our residents and our Maintenance Department personnel.

When you are being serviced by the Maintenance Department, we request that you have a mask on, show them where the issue is and then keep your distance and allow them to complete their work while following the safe distancing rules. They will notify you when the work has been completed and will provide any information or further instructions at that time.

The Maintenance Department reserves the right to leave your job if the above instructions are not followed and your work will then be rescheduled at a later date.
